

Andrew Phelling was burnt in the face, neck, breast and thighs by an explosion of one of the main guns. He survived but David Morris was less fortunate who was fatally injured in the same accident. Severely burnt over his forehead, face, neck and over the whole of his chest and back. He was bled but after a fortnight died.
